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INTRODUCTION

The Inception Workshop was held in Nicosia on 19-20 January 2006 at the Multi-Function Conference Hall of the Ministry of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Environment (MANRE). The Workshop was hosted by the Environment Service as part of its role as national implementing authority for CAMP Cyprus.

The Workshop was attended by over 60 participants listed in the List of Participants in Annex I. The Inception Workshop agenda is presented in Annex II. On the MAP side participants included representatives of MAP (Mr Paul Mifsud, MAP Coordinator, and Ms Tatjana HEMA, Programme Officer), PAP/RAC (Mr Ivica Trumbic, Director, and Mr Aleksandar Bjelica), Blue Plan RAC (Dr Simon Bell), SPA/RAC (Mr Daniel Cebrian Menchero and Mr Andreas Demetropoulos) and INFO/RAC (Mr Sergio Illuminato, Director, Mr Paolo Guglielmi, Ms Federica De Michelli and Ms Maria Tveritina). On the Cyprus side the participants included over 50 representatives from 16 Ministries, Government Departments, private Organizations and local level administration. Most of the Cyprus participants were national experts who have agreed to take active part in the implementation of CAMP Cyprus.

The Workshop expended over two days, the formal sessions were held on 19 January, between 9:00 – 18:00, and the second day on 20 January was reserved for meetings, consultations and a field trip.

FORMAL SESSION, THURSDAY 19 JANUARY

Welcoming addresses

The Workshop was opened by the welcoming address of the Director General of MANRE Mr Panicos Poulos. He referred to the importance Cyprus attributes to the rational use and sustainable management of coastal resources and stressed the Ministry's commitment to the successful implementation of CAMP Cyprus. He continued by expressing his satisfaction with the preparatory activities preceding the Workshop and concluded by expressing his support to CAMP Cyprus from which his Ministry and the Government of Cyprus expect sound results which should ultimately be adopted to guide changes and improvements to the national policy framework for coastal zone management.

Mr Nicos Georgiades, Director of Environment Service and National Project Director of CAMP Cyprus, welcomed the participants and noted the presence of a cross section of representatives of Government Ministries, Departments and other organizations, which he interpreted as indication of the interest in the Project. He continued to outline a few key ideas and concerns about coastal problems. He elaborated on the underlying causes of existing coastal management problems including weak local governance, conflicting targets, attachment on command-and-control practices, insufficient policy enforcement and inadequate tools for performance assessment. He referred to the slow pace of public responses to private initiatives, the tendency for over consumption and the lack of common vision on coastal management as important contributors to several continuing problems. He concluded that the way forward lies in moving from the 'why' to 'what' and 'how' through dialogue, participation, policy improvements and enhancement of tools for inclusive and effective management.

Mr Paul Mifsud, MAP Coordinator, extended his regards on behalf of MAP to the participants of the Workshop and particularly to the staff of the Ministry of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Environment and the Environment Service for organizing and hosting the Inception Workshop. He continued by expressing his strong interest in CAMP Cyprus and willingness to give MAP's technical and financial support and continuing encouragement to the Project. He commented favourably on the approach of CAMP Cyprus in focusing on policy level issues and the tools for addressing them through the accumulated experience and expertise of MAP consultants and national specialists supported and guided by experts in the various Government Ministries and Departments. He concluded by wishing successful implementation of CAMP Cyprus, looking forward to its wider contributions to the CAMP Programme as a whole.

Workshop presentations

Part I

Mr Glafkos Constantinides, Task Manager of CAMP Cyprus, referred to the activities for the organization of the Workshop and presented the contents of the Inception Report. It was noted that the Inception Report was placed in advance on the MANRE website and made available to all the participants. It was also mentioned that all the key participants had prior knowledge of the Report through meetings and exchanges initiated for this purpose by the Task Manager. In addition, he mentioned, the Agreement Report was presented to the representatives of the various organizations in September 2005. In his presentation the Task Manager alluded to the previous Reports preceding the preparation of the Inception Report (Diagnostic Feasibility Report of 2002 and the CAMP Cyprus Agreement of 2005) and went through the main elements of CAMP Cyprus stressing the emphasis on the core Activities, the role of the Steering Committee, personnel of the Project, the functions and responsibilities of the MAP Consultants and the National Specialists, and the importance of the advisory role of the Team Leaders and the Activity Experts. Particular emphasis was given to ICAM methodology and the tools of ICAM (Carrying Capacity Assessment, Strategic Environmental Assessment and Environmental Economics).

Mr Ivica Trumbic, PAP/RAC Director, expressed his deep satisfaction for the organization of the Inception Workshop marking the commencement of CAMP Cyprus following a series of preparatory activities by both MAP and the Cyprus Government. He welcomed the participants and gave a brief but concise overview of the CAMP Programme and its development. In particular, he presented the basic principles of CAMPs and the uses made of them by the various CAMPs in other countries and their diverse contributions to addressing coastal management conflicts towards sustainable resource management.

Professor Harry Coccossis, PAP/RAC Consultant on ICAM Methodology, introduced the nature, scope and objectives of ICAM methodology itself and elaborated on the main elements comprising its integrated approach to coastal resource management. He emphasized the key issues underlying ICAM interventions and explained the importance of national / local level interactions of initiatives that seek to influence sound management of coastal resources. He continued his exposition with reference to the policy challenges 'beyond interventions' relating to the instruments for strengthening the ICAM process and the institutional framework for maintaining ICAM as a relevant and effective part of planning and management in the national and local policy framework.

Part II

Miss Joanna Constantinidou, Environment Service and CAMP Cyprus National Coordinator, presented the National Policy Framework for the Environment. She outlined the specific policy areas covered by the responsibilities of the Environment Service (ES) (horizontal statutes, chemical substances, control of industrial pollution and risk assessment, protection and management of nature, noise management, waste management and water quality). She continued with an explanation of the functions of the ES and furthermore stressed the main strategic environmental concerns, such as water scarcity, energy demand, the impacts from transport, urban sprawl, rural depopulation and coastal pressures. She elaborated on all the policy aspects and concluded by stressing the need for achieving development without environmental deterioration, and the need for sustainability, cooperation between public institutions and greater involvement by local authorities and civil society.

Ms Christina Pandazi, Environment Service, analyzed the recently introduced law on SEA 102 (I) 2005, which transposed into Cyprus Law the EU Directive 201/42/EC. She outlined the main provisions of the SEA Law and dwelled on its scope covering plans and programmes on agriculture, husbandry, forestry, fishing, mining, energy, transport, communications, waste management, water, tourism, land use planning. Continuing, she described, *inter alia*, the procedure and the steps to be taken by the competent authorities in preparing plans and programmes under the SEA Law for submission to the Environmental Authority, and the composition of the evaluation committee.

Dr. Simon Bell, Blue Plan Consultant, made on behalf of Ms Elizabeth Coudert who was unable to attend the Inception Workshop, a brief presentation of the role and activities of Blue Plan within the wider mandate of MAP. He continued with his presentation of the objectives and main elements of the Systemic and Prospective Sustainability Analysis (recently recast into '*Imagine*'), analyzed how its interactive approach is developed through a participatory process in workshops and proceeded to show the application of '*Imagine*' in other CAMPs, notably Malta, Lebanon, Algeria and Slovenia. He stressed the relevance of '*Imagine*' to CAMP Cyprus as an approach to improve environmental awareness, to strengthening public participation through common definitions of problems and visions for the future, and alluded to the use of sustainability indicators as part of the '*Imagine*' methodology.

Mr Ermis Klokkaris, Department of Town Planning & Housing, elaborated on the Physical Planning National Policy Framework and Coastal Issues. Mr Klokkaris gave a brief review of the main pressures on the coastal areas (concentration of tourism, the small size of the island and the vulnerability of the coast to development, the close interaction with the hinterland, etc.). He continued to present the framework of the planning legislation (the Town & Country Planning Law of 1990) and the main Plans prepared under it (Local Plans, Area Schemes and Policy for the Countryside). He stressed that the 'Island Plan', the overall physical development strategy, is inactive due to the political problem of Cyprus. He presented for illustration the Limassol Seafront Area Scheme and the Ayia Napa Local Plan and referred to some of the main measures used in the planning process (mainly the Foreshore Protection Zone, Land Use Zoning, Tourism Development Low Density Measures and Local Design Schemes). He concluded by referring to the main weaknesses of the physical planning system (absence of a comprehensive strategic planning documents, widening of the regional disparities, ineffective enforcement and management mechanisms, absence of fiscal/economic instruments, pressures from local authorities and landowners) and

underlined the expectations from CAMP Cyprus (upgrading national/local institutional and human capacities for cooperation, participation and awareness, methodologies, tools and practices of sustainable development and the application of discretionary guidelines and principles).

Ms Athena Metaxa, Cyprus Tourism Organization, presented the Strategic Plan for Sustainable Tourism Development in Cyprus (2003-2010). The presentation provided introductory information on the development of the tourism sector now accounting for 97,000 beds, 2.5 million arrivals, 43% of foreign exchange from the export of goods and services and 13% direct contribution to GDP. She hastened to add that all these created serious capacity constraints to the beaches and the infrastructure. Continuing, she referred to the main objectives of the tourism plan including, environmental quality and the need to sustain and protect the environment and nature, management of the carrying capacity of beaches, control of tourism development and enrichment of the tourist product. Ms Metaxa analyzed the strategic objectives of the Plan including the achievement of sustainable tourism development, maximization of economic benefits from tourism, flexibility to changing market conditions and competitiveness in the international and regional market. She dwelled on the specific elements for promoting the strategic objectives (cultural development initiatives, special interest products, accommodation quality and standards, food and culinary products, efficient transport network, preparation of local action plans etc.), She concluded that environmental quality and protection of coastal resources from development impacts and sustainable use of carrying capacity run through the vision for tourism in Cyprus.

Miss Stavri Theodosiou, Coastal Unit of the Department of Public Works, presented the national policy on erosion in coastal areas. She gave brief information on the main causes of coastal erosion and the problems arising from the construction of beakwaters and groynes. Continuing, an outline was given of the strategy for defining the measures for the protection and improvement of the coastal area relative to erosion. She referred to the objectives of the strategy particularly the definition of the methods of coastal protection, the establishment of a monitoring system and the detailed survey undertaken on the 12 sections of the coast for that purpose. Six of them were selected as priority locations. At the end of this project three master plans were prepared (Limassol, Larnaca and Paphos south). She concluded by elaborating the guidelines for the future, namely, protection and improvement of the coastline retaining their natural character, applying sound principles of coastal engineering in tourism development areas, and minimizing the impacts on the coastline in areas with major infrastructure (ports, marinas, etc.).

Mr. Lefteris Embedoklis, Chief Town Planner of the Municipality of Larnaca, introduced the features of the area of town of Larnaca to the Inception Workshop and gave a brief but concise account of the land use profile and development issues with particular reference to the pressures on the coastal area. He referred to the presence of major land uses of national importance located in Larnaca, such as the Larnaca International Airport, the Oil Refinery, the Industrial Estate, the Desalination Plant, the Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Salt Lakes. He concluded by expressing his support and active participation to CAMP Cyprus and his strong interest in the implementation of the Pilot Application Case Studies in the Larnaca coastal area.

Part III

Mr Daniel Cebrian, of SPA/RAC, presented the outline of the approach proposed for the Biodiversity Aspects in ICAM prepared by SPA/RAC Consultants Alfonso A. Ramos Espla and Andreas Demetropoulos. The presentation emphasized at the outset the particularities of the marine environment relative to the terrestrial environment and called for the need to take this into account. Following on, he presented the objectives and findings of MedSpa project recently carried out in three coastal/marine areas of Cyprus (Cape Greco, Moullia Rocks and Akamas). He referred to the species which underlie and enrich the marine biodiversity in these areas and continued to dwell on the main threats to biodiversity from land-based activities in these areas and more widely in other parts of the coastal areas of Cyprus from tourism and building development. He concluded by expressing a preference for the Chrysochou Bay area for a Case Study due to its richer biodiversity value.

Ms Myroula Hadjichristoforou, Department of Fisheries and Marine Research, presented an overview of the main characteristics of the marine environment in Cyprus and the species that present particular interest. She presented the legal framework for the protection of the marine environment from various sources and went on to spell out the Laws used by the Department to designate Marine Protected Areas (Water Framework Directive, Nutrients Directive, Habitats Directive, Bathing Waters Directive). She referred also to the provisions of the main Conventions that guide/determine the national policy framework (Barcelona Convention, Protocols of the Bern Convention). In her conclusion she referred to the related UNEP Projects in which Cyprus participated (MEDPOL, MedMPA, SAP/BIO, MedVeg).

Mr Spyros Stephanou, Water Development Department, presented the Effects on Water Resources from Coastal Development and referred first to the impacts of over-pumping, sea intrusion, nitrate pollution and leaching of nitrates into the sea, and continued to outline the most typical effects on water resources from uncontrolled coastal development, such as the increased demand for water by building development in irrigated areas. He then presented the water management policies and the construction of dams and their environmental effects and concluded with the more recently adopted policies on water with respect to desalination, water treatment and recycling from sewerage, and stressed the opportunities for coastal development through adoption of wise practices for sustainable use of water.

Mr Paolo Guglielmi, INFO/RAC, gave an overview of the mandate of Info/RAC for providing technical support in the area of information sharing and development of an integrated network of communication. Its objectives within the framework of CAMP Cyprus are to establish sustainable partnerships and effective communication & awareness building across sectors (partners and stakeholders); and to develop a coordinated, coherent, innovative communication and information action to enhance the impact of the project activities and increase their chances of success. Info/RAC proposed to develop the following main activities:

- Creation of a CAMP Information & Partnership Building Team (IPBT) including selected members of the CAMP partners;
- Design and put on-line a specific CAMP project website with intranet facility;
- Conceive and design an attractive “ad hoc” brochure for the project and provide to its wide dissemination;

- Organise a communication event for the completion of the project to present national and international media the results and successes of the CAMP.

Mr Kyriakos Kyriakou, Department of Forestry, presented the national policy framework on Forestry. He outlined the resources of his Department, the relevant Laws and the main objectives of the new National Forestry Policy (2006). He added useful information on the extent and location of forest areas in Cyprus and those located in the coastal area.

Mr Andreas Antoniou, Natural Resource Information and Remote Sensing Centre, presented the policy and objectives, the activities and the resources of the Centre which was established in 1990 with assistance from FAO to utilize new technology and provide spatial information management to the Departments of the Ministry of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Environment. The Centre has capability for remote sensing, GIS and cartography. The Centre provided, *inter alia*, significant inputs to the Nature 2000 project and to the designation and monitoring of the Forestry Special Protection Areas (SPA). The presentation showed several maps illustrating the activities of the Centre.

Part IV

Miss Nasia Dikogoropoulou, Environment Service, presented the system of Public Participation in Decision Making. In her introduction she referred to the purposes of public participation for enhancing accountability and transparency, contributing to public awareness and improving the quality of final decisions. She continued to outline the principles of Aarhus Convention and moved on to the existing system in Cyprus. In this regard she explained the main provisions of the national Laws on EIA (57) (I) 2001 and 104 (I) 2005 and SEA (102) (I) 2005, as well as other Laws such as the Law on packaging and packaging wastes (159) (I) 2005, the Law on the control of water and soil pollution 160 (I) 2005, the Law on soil and hazardous wastes 162 (I) 2005, the Law on the quality of atmospheric air 161 (I) 2005.

Mr Glafkos Constantinides, PAP/RAC Consultant, presented the basic principles underlying the application of Environmental Economics (EE) in CAMPs, and CAMP Cyprus in particular, and explained the role of EE in seeking to introduce market-based information (through resource valuation) to supplement the more established instruments of resource protection practiced through 'control' and 'awareness'. He analyzed the problem of lack of information on the social value of coastal resources and how EE attempts to address this problem through the estimation of social benefits from environmental protection thus providing the missing information needed to compare with the benefits from land and sea use development on which decisions typically rely. He referred to the information objective, the conservation objective and the management objective of resource valuation and stressed the importance of methods for tapping environmental benefits revealed by resource valuation. In this regard he continued to explain the role of fiscal instruments in capturing some of the benefits of sustainable use of coastal resources and concluded to present the tentative plan for the implementation of the EE Activity and the Pilot Application Case Study.

Discussion

The discussion session did not raise any crucial issues overlooked or under-emphasized by the proposals of the Inception Report, nor did it propose any changes to the

Objectives, Activities and Outputs of CAMP Cyprus. It was noted by responses to questions that the key aspects of the Project were elaborated in previous national level meetings (notably the Presentation of the CAMP Cyprus Agreement of 7 September 2005), individual meetings with the main national participants and the successive consultations with PAP/RAC.

The main issues commented upon and the responses provided focused mainly on the following:

- The stress placed by CAMP Cyprus on coastal management policy integration and the important role of the ICAM methodology and the tools (CCA, SEA and EE) in achieving this overriding purpose.
- The significant role of the MAP consultants in proposing Cyprus-based guidelines and practical and concrete strategies for incorporating ICAM and ICAM tools in the national policy framework, the national-based information and professional support to be provided by the commissioned National Specialists, and the advise / guidance to be given by the Team Leaders and National Experts attached to the various participating Government Ministries / Departments and other relevant Organizations.
- The expected contribution of CAMP Cyprus to the strengthening of Physical Planning and Tourism, and their interactions with water resource management, agriculture, cultural heritage and landscape, public participation and awareness, etc., in realizing the already adopted goals concerning sustainable coastal development.
- The concern expressed by SPA/RAC to give greater emphasis on the marine environment as a particular biodiversity issue relative to the terrestrial environment and the preference indicated for the Chrysochou Bay Pilot Area for the Case Study given its biodiversity profile.

Before the closure of the Workshop Mr Nicos Georgiades (Director of ES and National Project Director) and Mr Glafkos Constantinides (CAMP Cyprus Task Manager) referred to the immediate tasks to be pursued, such as the recruitment of the National Specialists, the convening of the Steering Committee and the preparation of a detailed programme for the Activities.

At the end, it was announced that the following morning (Friday 20 January) would be devoted to individual meetings of the representatives of the RACs with national experts.
